Saint Joe's Head of School Ms. Jennifer Mallett views Catholic Schools Week as a way to have some fun and to celebrate the school's Catholic identity. #### Senior Checklist for College Readiness

- 1. Meet with your counselor to go over your graduation requirements and plan.
- 2. Visit as many colleges if possible. If you can't visit in person, do virtual tours.
- 3. Request an updated senior transcript be sent to the colleges of your choice.
- 4. Ask specific recommenders to write you a letter of recommendation.
- 5. Request your letters of recommendation be sent to the colleges of your choice.
- 6. Fill out your FAFSA Application and any Scholarships Opportunities.

7. Focus on dates and deadlines for your college applications, FAFSA application and scholarships.

8. Send SAT or ACT scores to the colleges of your choice. (Only if requested by your specific college).

If you are student-athlete, fill out the NCAA requirements and contact college coaches.
 Check your college portals to see if you have items still needed to complete the college application process.

#### Junior Checklist to College Readiness

1. Identify your goals and priorities

2. Research the type of career and training you will need by visiting <u>O\*NET</u> Online

3. Explore the schools that offer the training and degrees that you might be interested in attending.

4. Make sure the classes you are taking at Saint Joseph's match with what you would need

to take for your degree or to get into the field you are interested in at that college.

5. Discuss options with your parents or guardians about schools and career options.

6. Discuss how to pay for college (parents will pay, or will you be paying for college)?

7. Login to CollegeBoard.org to make an account to register for the SAT or ACT exams. If you already have an account from taking the PSAT testing last year, you will use the same login.

8. Take at least two standardized tests (SAT or ACT) before the end of the summer after your junior year. If you can't get two tests in before the end of the summer, you must have all your testing done by October in order to begin the application process to colleges for early action (November 1<sup>st</sup>) in your senior year.

9. Identify the colleges you would like to visit. Please try to visit at least 5 to 6 colleges before October of your senior year.

10. For each college you visit/have interest, go to the admissions or undergraduate admissions tab to create a login account for that college.

11. Set up a day to visit that college. Make sure you bring questions to ask about the college. Research what the college has to offer for your degree or college activities. Also research the career placement in your field at that college.

12. If you are a student athlete looking to play in college D-1, D-2 or D-3, please make sure you fill out the NCAA Eligibility form by going

to <u>ncaa.org/playcollegesportseligibiltycenter.org</u>. You must have this form filled out if you are planning to play competitive sports in college.

# **Our Sacred Infirmities**

Around the same time, I was preparing to write this month's article, I was also preparing my sermon for the Sixth Monday in Ordinary Time. The story (Mark 1:40-45) is a familiar one. A leper approaches Jesus and, "kneeling down begged him and said, 'if you wish you can make me clean" Not only was the leper suffering from a terrible skin disease, but he was considered "unclean/dirty" and, therefore, was alienated from communal worship in the Temple and from communal life in general. Jesus crosses the boundaries of this man's alienation and marginalization and heals him through touch. The Swiss mystic and spiritual writer Adrienne von Speyr in reflecting on this story writes the following:

The Lord never hears a request with indifference. He answers, directing his love to the one making the request. Jesus touches the leper physically, with his outstretched hand; although the disease is



filthy, repulsive, infectious, he does not shrink from laying his hand on the sick man, on his diseased skin, directly on what is most repulsive. The sick man asked for this... We confess, we lay bare our illness (our infirmities), to the Lord, and insofar as we show it, we hope for him to lay his hand directly on the spot that is diseased. He is not repulsed; he loves the sick man, and love overcomes all things.

I think it is important to mention, that had this man not had leprosy, he may not have met Jesus along the way. It was the leprosy itself that allowed this encounter.

We, like Jesus, are asked to reach out to the marginalized, to recognize the "lepers" among us whatever their symptoms. We encounter people every day who feel they are not worthy of the love of Christ, who are outcast because they feel unclean or unworthy. But, before we reach out to these, we have to recognize that we, to one degree or another, all experience alienation. All of us feel that there is something hindering our "acceptance" or in other words we are all calling out, "if you wish you can make me clean." This Lent we come before Christ and we allow all of those things that we think keep him away from us to become a chance for an encounter with him. Jesus did not embrace the man in spite of his leprosy, rather he embraced him through his leprosy. He touched him as Von Speyr says, "directly on what is most repulsive."

The very things that we think keeps us from God, from Jesus Christ are actually opportunities for an encounter. They are what I like to call our *sacred infirmities*. We come before God bringing all of this "stuff" and we hear the words from Matthew's Gospel, "moved with pity, he stretched out his hand, touched him, and said to him, 'I do will it." We all long for the mercy or in the words of this passage the pity of God. We need to reimagine God over and over again as we move more and more closer to a God who does not long to judge us, but rather longs to offer His pity, His mercy.

The cry to be made clean is a cry to be made whole again. We suffer from all sorts of things. For some it is addiction, depression, anxiety. For others it is a life that has left us wounded, or a dark secret from the past. For many of us, it is simply a feeling of

unworthiness. We are all wounded in some way. But, somewhere along the line this great lie began to weave its way into Christianity/Catholicism and it goes something like this: Christianity/Catholicism is for the "clean, the pious, and the moral." This lie has left so many others along the way feeling unworthy of the love of Christ. And yet the story of the leper tells us that the exact opposite is true. Jesus Christ embraces us precisely through our infirmities. Just like the leper he anoints them and declares them *sacred*. He works through our *sacred infirmities* to show us a love that we could never imagine.

He touches us precisely in that spot where we feel most repulsive, most unloved. The words of Mark's Gospel now spoken directly by Jesus ring in our ears. "*I am moved with pity for you.*" We begin to embrace a God who is actually *moved* with pity for us and we allow ourselves to be made clean, to be healed, to be radically loved and radically accepted precisely how we are. And then, we become agents of this same love as we go out into the world moved with pity ourselves seeking to break through the alienation that others experience by sharing the same healing touch that Christ has shared with us. We begin to see the world and ourselves in a whole different way when we realize that our wounds, while often repulsive to us, are, through the eyes of Christ, seen as nothing short of *sacred infirmities.*
