Father Gregory Boyle, a priest who works with gang members in LA, has often been quoted saying, "no treatment plan is worth a damn if it is based on the wrong diagnosis." He goes on to argue that this is the problem with most gang members. Either by law enforcement, society, or even their own family they are written off as bad well before they choose to enter a gang. They have received the wrong diagnosis. The right diagnosis he goes on to say is a "lethal lack of hope." They come to his rehabilitation program called "Homeboy Industries" to have this hope restored. I would like to suggest that we too have a tendency to

misdiagnose the world and even more importantly those around us. Quite frankly we are all likely to even misdiagnose ourselves. We categorize right and wrong, good and bad as if they are simply qualities that are inherent in people. And again, and again, a wrong diagnosis leads to a bad treatment plan.

### Winter Recap

Boys Basketball earned a spot in the District VI Class A semi-finals and played Bishop Carroll. Brendan Scanlon became the third player in program history to score 1000 points. The team finished with a 6-13 record on the season.

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Witmer and Ohl Wrestle into the History Books



Walking into the Giant Center in Hershey, PA for the PIAA A state wrestling tournament felt a little bit different this year. There were obvious, visible changes in place from state tournaments past—fewer fans, masks, social distancing, etc. Amonn and Zack certainly rose to the challenges and earned third place state finishes in their respective weight classes.

Both Amonn and Zack wrestled for four years at Saint Joe's and are not only glad that they finished what they started four years ago, but that they did it together. Amonn said, "I am glad that it was Zack that stuck with me the whole time. We push each other well."

Amonn began wrestling as a four-year-old growing up in West Virginia. After winning states at age six, wrestling became a staple in his life. "It's just a part of my lifestyle. So it was never anything that I questioned not doing." Since that first state championship, Amonn has continued to have a decorated wrestling career. In his four years wrestling for Saint Joe's Amonn has accumulated two district championships, qualified for states four times, and placed at states twice. As for his wrestling legacy, Amonn wants to be known as "Someone who is willing to do the work even when they really, really don't want to." Amonn will continue to put in the hard work as he furthers his wrestling career at the collegiate level.

Zack also began wrestling from a young age: 3-years-old. When you have done something for so long, it becomes a part of who you are. Despite that, Zack wants to be known for more than a wrestler. "Wrestling is not just my full identity. I want to be remembered as a good person who always tried to do the right thing." Over his four years, Zack won two district championships, one regional championship, and became a four-time state place winner. Zack's high school wrestling days have come to an end, and this is something he has yet to fully grasp saying, "I don't know if it hasn't hit yet. On one hand, it is sad because we had a good time here with a lot of good memories with the guys on the team. On the other hand, it is exciting to have more time. Amonn and I are both looking forward to the future." As for that future, Zack will join Columbia University's wrestling roster.

**Describe your college experience; Where you attended; Your major(s) both undergrad and graduate; A couple of your favorite things about your college experience. What are you currently doing from a career or education standpoint?**

## College Corner



### Senior Checklist to College Readiness

1. Meet with your counselor to go over your graduation requirements and plan.

2. Visit as many colleges if possible. If you can't visit in person, do virtual tours.
3. Request an updated senior transcript be sent to the colleges of your choice.
4. Ask specific recommenders to write you a letter of recommendation.
5. Request your letters of recommendation be sent to the colleges of your choice.
6. Fill out your FAFSA Application and any Scholarships Opportunities.
7. Focus on dates and deadlines for your college applications, FAFSA application and scholarships.
8. Send SAT or ACT scores to the colleges of your choice. (Only if requested by your specific college).
9. If you are student-athlete, fill out the NCAA requirements and contact college coaches.
10. Check your college portals to see if you have items still needed to complete the college application process.

May 1st is College Decision Day!

This is an exciting time for our Seniors! Soon they will be making a very important decision regarding their next step after high school. Below is information for seniors to make sure they have completed before May 1st (Decision Day) .

- Watch your email for notifications from your colleges or go to your college portals for notifications
- Check out your options if you're put on a waitlist
- Compare Financial Aid packages
- Prepare for the last standardized tests if needed
- Make your final college decision before May 1st
- Follow up on financial aid information
- Complete enrollment paperwork for your college you will attend
- Fill out paperwork from Saint Joe's on your senior plans and scholarships

Being prepared to make the next step after high school is crucial for success!!!

### **Junior Checklist to College Readiness**

1. Identify your goals and priorities
2. Research the type of career and training you will need by visiting O\*NET Online
3. Explore the schools that offer the training and degrees that you might be interested in attending.
4. Make sure the classes you are taking at Saint Joseph's match with what you would need to take for your degree or to get into the field you are interested in at that college.
5. Discuss options with your parents or guardians about schools and career options.
6. Discuss how to pay for college (parents will pay, or will you be paying for college)?
7. Login to CollegeBoard.org to make an account to register for the SAT or ACT exams. If you already have an account from taking the PSAT testing last year, you will use the same login.
8. Take at least two standardized tests (SAT or ACT) before the end of the summer after your junior year. If you can't get two tests in before the end of the summer, you must have all of your testing done by October in order to begin the application process to colleges for early action (November 1st) in your senior year.
9. Identify the colleges you would like to visit. Please try to visit at least 5 to 6 colleges before October of your senior year.
10. For each college you visit/have interest, go to the admissions or undergraduate admissions tab to create a login account for that college.
11. Set up a day to visit that college. Make sure you bring questions to ask about the college. Research what the college has to offer for your degree or college activities. Also research the career placement in your field at that college.
12. If you are a student athlete looking to play in college D-1, D-2 or D-3, please make sure you fill out the NCAA Eligibility form by going to [naac.org/playcollegesportseligibilitycenter.org](http://naac.org/playcollegesportseligibilitycenter.org) . You must have this form filled out if you are planning to play competitive sports in college.
